

GWHI Classroom Activities Generating History Questions from Declarative Statements

Learning Goals:

- Recognize that any simple declarative statement is loaded with implicit assumptions and based on extensive prior knowledge of historic context and antecedents.
- Generate questions by engaging fisticuffs with the text.

Activity

Take any declarative sentence from a history text and ask students to generate a question from it.

Example:

Several factors contributed to Chicago's need for a larger, more centralized, and efficient stockyard. One of these was the westward expansion of railroads, causing Chicago to evolve into a major railroad center and experience massive commercial growth.¹

Sample Question's:

- 1. Why did the RR's expand?
- 2. Why was the fate of the RR so tied to Chicago or vice versa: What was their historic relationship prior to the time discussed in the statement above? Why did western RR expansion "cause" Chicago to become a major RR center?
- 3. What sorts of massive commercial growth resulted what sorts of production expanded as a result of the RR hub?
